

REPORT OF THE DEATH OF AN AMERICAN CITIZEN.

Name: James Francis Donnelly M.D.

Native or naturalized: Native

Date of death: February 22, 1915

Place of death: Gievgili, Servia

Cause of death: Gun shot wound self inflicted while delirious from typhus exanthematique

Disposition of remains: Buried at Gievgili on February 26, 1915, in a zinc lined coffin hermetically sealed.

Local law as to disinterring remains in case it is desired to bring them home:

Buried in Servian territory. A corps buried in a metallic casket hermetically sealed may be disinterred after one year. If buried in any other way, remains can not be disinterred before the expiration of seven years.

Disposition of effects: Sent to Major Robert U. Patterson, Chief of Bureau of Medical Service, American National Red Cross, Washington, by Dr. Ethan Flagg Butler, Director of American National Red Cross Servian Unit No. II. An inventory of the effects of the deceased as prepared by Dr. Butler appears on the reverse side of this report.

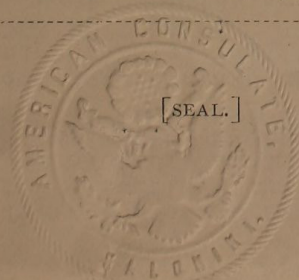

Remarks: Dr. James F. Donnelly was an accredited staff physician of the American National Red Cross, Servian Unit No. II stationed at Gievgili, Servia. He became ill with typhus exanthematique on February 17, 1915, no apprehension for his ultimate recovery was felt although during the following four nights he had delirious spells. The morning of the 22nd he appeared much depressed and later on became delirious. During the absence of his attendant he took an old musket and shot himself through the forehead. Death was almost instantaneous.
