He became ill with typhus exanthematique on February 17,1915, no apprehension for his ultimate recovery was felt although during the following four nights he had delirious spells. The morning of the 22nd he appeared much depressed and later on became delirious. During the absence of his attendant he took an old musket and shot himself through the forehead. Death was almost instantaneous.
