

NURSES OFF FOR GERMANY.

With Red Cross Supplies They Will
Relieve Four Now There.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—For the purpose of relieving four American Red Cross trained nurses who have been on duty in Germany for the last six months, the American Red Cross has just sent to Germany on the steamer Rotterdam four other enrolled Red Cross trained nurses. They are Misses Edith L. Wood and Caroline R. Bauer of Philadelphia, and Misses Louise Hoelderlin and Florence K. Ulmer of New York.

Several heavy supplementary shipments of Red Cross supplies have been made to Germany and Servia by the American Red Cross. On the Scandinavian-American steamer California 212 cases of hospital supplies have been sent to the German Red Cross headquarters in Berlin. Sixty-three cases are being carried on the same vessel for the American Red Cross Hospital in Munich.

To the Servian Red Cross at Nish, the American Red Cross has forwarded 206 cases of hospital supplies, and to Dr. Ethan Flagg Butler, surgeon director of the American Red Cross work in Gev Galia, Servia, 105 cases of hospital supplies and clothing.

The death in Gev Galia of Dr. James F. Donnelly of New York, one of the American Red Cross surgeons, on Feb. 22, has brought the following cablegram to American Red Cross headquarters from the Vice President of the Servian Red Cross, Dr. Soubititch:

"We extend the deepest sympathy in the death of Dr. Donnelly, who died doing his duty for suffering humanity."
